Kings District Employees

Our District Commander for Kings, Inspector Bill Collier. S/Sgt. Dan Archibald continues to manage Operations for Kings. Sgt. Mitch Pelletier Ops NCO Wolfville.

Of the forty general duty constables who police Kings District as first responders, eight are assigned to Wolfville. Kings District constables are supervised by eight corporals, two sergeants, and one staff sergeant.

Efforts are still underway to staff both School Safety Resource Officer positions for the 2025-2026 school year.

Cpl. Travis Collins Team Lead for General Investigation Section (GIS) and our Street Crime Enforcement Unit (SCEU). GIS consists of two constable investigators while SCEU is an integrated team consisting of two Kings District RCMP constables and one constable from the Kentville Police Service.

Kings District has ten Detachment Services Assistants who perform administrative functions at the three Kings District offices. That of course includes our brand new Wolfville Detachment Assistant, Jaimelee Chambers.

2025 Acadia Homecoming was well actioned by Wolfville Compliance and RCMP. RCMP had the Mobile Command Post in place. 8 RCMP Tac Troop members were present for a 12 hrs shift along with a complement of 8 overtime members to assist the on duty members. Control of the streets were excellent up until 1800 hrs when the dynamics changed and people started to overflow onto the street. Some incidents were reported and actioned by police but none became overwhelming. Members turned to crowed control which lead to very little enforcement opportunities due to high numbers of young people on the streets and in the yards.

Further discussions have been had in preparation for future large events and will be modified to adjust for better coverage. Even with the large number of people present, calls for service were not high.



Mental Health Related Calls for Service

There have been 15 mental health related calls for service over the reporting period. These calls ranged from medical interventions to complaints where weapons were allegedly involved.
